Welcome to Middle School Admissions

This year, your child will apply to middle school. Much is different across our city and country right now—from how children attend school to how we share public spaces. Yet whatever this echool year brings, we will be here to support you and your child through middle school admissions. This letter will help you get started.

Your child can apply to up to 12 middle school programs with one personalized application.

Throughout this process, you will use one website, MySchools, to explore middle schools, register for tests/auditions, submit your application, and get a middle school offer. MySchools and your MYC Schools Account (NYCSA) are separate websites; you will use separate eccounts to log into each one:

- You'll use MySchools (MySchoolsunys) this year to explore school options, submit your child's application, and get your middle school offer, and get waitlist information.
- You'll use NYCSA (MyStudent.nyc) during each school year to see your child's grades, attendence, fitness results, and schedule, as well as get emergency alerts and school-specific updates.

Right new, you can...

- Subscribe for small updates at achools anyong private | We'll send you admissions tips and updates, including when the middle school application period will open and close.
- Set up your MySchools account at MySchools.nyc. Here's how:
- Click or tap "Sat Started." Follow the on-screen instruction. Then check your email for a message from MySchools. In that email, click the link to access your MySchools account.

- Click "Add a child" to connect your child to your account. On the next screen, enter your child's 9-digit student ID number (QSIS). You can find this ID number on their report card or request it from their current school.
- Enter your child's unique MySchools Account Creation Code, shown below. (Not the same as your NYCSA code)

Do not share this code with anyone and keep it in a safe place. If you have more than one child applying to school this year, you will get one letter like this for each child. If you need to access your child's records but are not the parent/guardian addressed in this letter, please contact your child's school or call 718-838-2009.

Chancellor Carranza's memo

December 18, 2020

Dear Families,

This has been a year of new challenges and difficult choices, testing our collective strength and endurance as we have faced the unknown together. We have had to reinvent the building blocks of public education in the nation's largest school system, from how to "go to class," to grading policy, attendance, and everything in between.

Today I am writing with an update on another fundamental pillar of your child's education: enrolling in middle school for next September. I want to thank you for your patience as we have worked for months to talk to families and conduct careful analysis to develop a new middle school admissions policy that meets this challenging moment. This new policy will better support your child's learning journey, and that of their fellow 70,000 fifth graders, as we look ahead to Fall 2021.

We have made some changes to the middle school enrollment process this year. This year's middle school application will open the week of January 11. New York City Department of Education (DOE) middle schools will <u>not</u> use academic records, auditions, or other screens or assessments to evaluate or admit students this year. Schools will maintain priority for students living in the district, because we heard from families across the city that they want to attend middle school closer to home. If a school has more applicants than available seats, offers will be made using a random lottery. In a small number of schools that have launched their own Diversity in Admissions pilots, they will admit priority groups of students first based on their school plans.


Here is why.

New York City is home to nearly 200 middle schools—40% of all middle schools—that "screen" students for admission using academic records, auditions, attendance, discipline records, special assessments, interviews, or other measures. They've historically used these academic and other records from a student's fourth grade to determine if they're suitable for entry to the school.

This year, we do not have much of this typical screening information because of the effects of the pandemic. The State did not administer standardized tests for fourth graders last year. The grading policy required revision to meet the unprecedented ending to the last school year. Attendance and other key policies shifted to accommodate the circumstances families were enduring because of the pandemic. Generally speaking, the measures these screened schools traditionally relied on for making admissions decisions are no longer available.

What's more, as Chancellor, it is my responsibility to deliver the highest-quality education possible to each of your children, so that they are prepared for a successful, productive life, and empowered with the skills they need to chase their dreams. There are inequities in our City and in our school system that have been exacerbated this year by the disproportionate impact the COVID-19 health crisis has had on our communities of color, our immigrant families, the students whose parents never had the option to work from home, and more. When I've spoken to families, students, and leaders of screened schools about potential changes, they have articulated the ways these policies can be an obstacle to that goal for many students, because the screening criteria can be so closely connected to a student's housing stability and economic status.

That is why, now more than ever, it is so important to deliver the proven benefits of more inclusive classrooms to our students. Inclusive learning environments are proven to encourage the development of critical thinking skills. They are linked to long-term success and life opportunities and lead to higher graduation achievement and better access to social and professional networks for more students.

Step 1

Setup account at MySchools.nyc with Creation code.

Step 2

Beginning week of January 11 through February 9 --- login to MySchool.nyc Each student's personalized application will map/list schools eligible to apply to based upon home address. Click on school of interest, it will provide school details.

Step 3

Rank maximum 12 schools/program choices.

Families should list in your genuine true order of preference.

Include your zoned school.

Step 4

Search, Apply, Submit, receive Receipt of your submission with schools listing. *Changed your selection after "Submit"?* You may change as many times your submission before February 9 deadline. A new Receipt will be generated.



Middle School Admissions Checklist

Get ready for middle school! All New York City 5th graders—and 6th graders at schools that end in 6th grade—can apply to middle school this winter.

The middle school application opens the week of January 11, 2021, and the deadline to apply is February 9. Apply to up to 12 programs on your child's application; list programs in your true order of preference, with your first choice at the top as #1.

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- Use the searchable middle school directory at MySchools.nyc to explore school options.
- Check schools' websites: find resources and learn if schools will be hosting any virtual events.
- Learn about admissions, watch our video series, and get all the latest updates at schools.nyc.gov/Middle.
- Find your school district (1-32) and learn if your child has a zoned school or schools by entering your address at schools.nyc.gov/Find-a-School or calling 311.
- You can get personalized support on- or offline, including by phone—see below.

December 2020

Set up your MySchools account so you'll be ready to apply! In mid-December 2020, welcome letters were mailed to all current 5th grade DOE public school students; this letter includes your child's unique MySchools account creation code so you can access your account and add them to it.

January - February 2021

- The middle school application opens the week of January 11. We'll let you know when the application is open. Then, you can log in to your MySchools account to see your child's options, save favorite programs, and build your application.
- Apply to middle school by February 9, 2021. Submit your application online at MySchools.nyc, through your school counselor, or through a Family Welcome Center.

Spring - Summer 2021

Add your child to additional waitlists and check your place on any waitlist with MySchools. If a program can make your child a waitlist offer, they will contact you directly.

Your Middle School Program Options



First, learn where your child can apply

Until the week of January 11 | Before the application opens, the public MySchools directory shows all middle schools in the city.

Check any program's eligibility on its MySchools page to see Myour child can apply.

District programs	District programs may be open only to students who live or go to school in that district; others may be open only to students in a very specific area, or zone. Your child can apply to programs in their middle achool district and in the district where they attend elementary school (if it is different).
Boroughwide programs	Boroughwide programs are open to students who live and/or go to school in the same borough as the school. If, for example, your child lives in Brooklyn, they are nigible to apply to boroughwide programs in Brooklyn.
Citywida programs	Citywide programs are open to all students who live in New York City.

Beginning the week of January 11 | When the application is open and you are logged in to MySchools.mys, your personalized directory will display all of (and only) the options where your child can apply.

New This year, programs that formerly screened applicants will not use students' academic information for administrate. Instead, for all students entering middle school in full 2921, these programs will make offers using the admissions factors already used by most NYC middle schools, as listed below. Screening is paused because the measures traditionally relied on for evaluating applicants are not available this year.

Pausing screens increases access to more schools for more students. A key benefit is that inclusive learning environments are proven to encourage the development of critical thinking skills. They are linked to long-term success and lead to higher graduation achievement and better access to social and professional networks for more students. We will engage further with school communities to determine the role of screens in fluture years.
